



Although this story takes place in California in the 1930's and describes the issues of the Dust Bowl Era and the Great Depression, the themes from the novel are relevant today. Key themes include the despair over loss of land and how this impacts one's identity, the power of community, the necessity for meaningful work, and the human capacity to overcome obstacles, create change and survive. Figures in the Dust blends spoken words from the novel, historic visuals from the Steinbeck library, music, and movement to create a compelling work that is both educational and entertaining.
